May Program Notes: Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP): Basic Facts & Best Management Practices contid from pg 1

In addition to the description of the project, those responsible for the project, and the operators' cooperative agreement which describes the stormwater responsibilities for all construction operators, the report then contains a general schedule with the Best Management Practices (BMPs) to be incorporated at each step.

Why all this attention to stormwater pollution prevention?

There are more water pollution incidents in the construction industry than any other industry. Sediment from disturbed land carries heavy metals, nutrients, oil, grease, pathogens, and trash to the various water sources. As rainwater collects these pollutants and moves downstream, there is stream-widening, down-cutting, flooding, and an increase of stormwater volume and velocity. Aquatic habitats are reduced, and stream temperatures are increased due to the higher presence of metal and additives. It is our legal responsibility not only to construct the job, but to ensure the land around the jobsite will be cared for as well.

Permits and Practices

To remedy the always present pollution problem, the EPA issues National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits that identify the limits on what is permissible to discharge, reporting and monitoring requirements and other provisions to make sure the discharge does not negatively impact citizens or animal health. Other permits are issued by the California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA). The permit points out the requirements of the Clean Water Act into specific categories tailored to the operations of those who are releasing pollutants. It is the responsibility of the company or those holding the permit to determine which Best Management Practices (BMPs) are most effective at keeping the pollutants within the guidelines.

What are BMPs?

Stormwater Best Management Practices focus on water quality problems caused by impervious surfaces such as roads, driveways, ports, airports, parking lots and industrial areas, *i.e.*, distribution centers and airports, which use paved areas covered by impenetrable materials such as asphalt and concrete.

There are two types of stormwater BMPs:, structural and non structural. Structural BMPs can be silt fences, sedimentation ponds, gradient terraces, slop diversions, erosion control blankets Non-structural BMPs include personnel training, public education, sweeping, trash removal, and equipment maintenance. The BMP for the jobsite is chosen based upon the site characteristics and the objectives set forth for pollution removal. Recap Article about the April 2018 ASPE Site Tour and Dinner Meeting Presentation for San Diego State University's Tula Conference Center and Tenochca Hall Addition

an Diego Chapter #4 made a return visit to San Diego State University to tour another project on the southeast side of the campus. We are indebted to the Project Team members with PCL Construction Services, Inc. and Gensler, the collaborative Design/Build consortium for the Tula Conference Center and Tenochca Hall Addition facilities. Kevin Smart, Project Manager; Chantel Marcq, Project Engineer; and Carmen Wong, Architect shepherded our assembly of members, guests, and students through the buildings, while explaining the key features involved in the construction.

Six members and eight guests attended the outing. We were fortunate to have University Mechanical's Project Estimator and Project Manager, as well as Dynalectric San Diego's Project Manager, accompany us on the tour. At the 12,000 SF Tula Conference Center, the group viewed the lathing and exterior skin, the stained wood trusses inside the 4,000 SF set of conference rooms, and the MEP rough-ins. We then walked over to the 9,000 SF Tenochca Hall and looked at the interior finishes and a wonderful linear wood ceiling in the entry area.

Dan Luckhardt CPE is currently teaching the CM202 estimating class at NewSchool of Architecture + Design's Construction Management program. He brought 32 of his 41 architecture and CM students to PCL's jobsite to see firsthand some of the challenges faced by contractors in completing projects. Surprisingly, 10 or 12 of the total number were women enrolled in one of the two fields of study. The students asked a lot of excellent questions of our site tour hosts concerning the various construction activities observed during the one-hour journey through the two buildings. Following completion of the tour, we adjourned to Nicolosi's Italian Restaurant to enjoy a scrumptious Italian feast of Pizzas, Spaghetti and Meatballs, Green Salad, and Warm Italian Bread. Many of the diners filled boxes with leftover Pizza and styrofoam containers of Spaghetti and Meatballs. The Project Team shared additional information about the projects at the conclusion of the meal. Once again, we appreciate the efforts of PCL in arranging the site tour and providing informative dialogue to our group.

During my pursuit to transition from working as a carpenter to becoming an estimator, I was taking Certificate in Construction Estimating courses put on by Bob George, FCPE, and endorsed by ASPE. Most of the instructors were ASPE members who encouraged me to join ASPE. After I became an estimator and a member of ASPE for a couple of years, I made it my goal to become a certified professional estimator as soon as I had the required 5 years of estimating experience.

2. How is it useful for your having CPE certification?

Most importantly, it provided me with the confidence that comes with a certification that is widely recognized among fellow estimators and the construction industry as a whole. Having a CPE behind my name gave me the opportunity to make clients aware of my level of competency and integrity that is required of a CPE.

The 2,500-word paper was the first step in the process and it was quite a challenge for me to write. Just like any other challenges in life, once I decided that success was my only option, I was able to succeed. Studying for the tests was pretty straight forward. I studied the available material thoroughly and spoke with every person I could find who had previously taken the test and asked them for their advice.
